# The Most Holy Trinity

# May 27, 2018

It is a scene that I have witnessed countless times in my brief time as a deacon. The parents present their beautiful child for baptism. The infant, dressed in a pristine white gown, is about to encounter the Trinity in a unique and beautiful way. I trace the sign of the cross on the baby's forehead and invite the parents to do the same. This rite of baptism culminates in the pouring of water over the baby's head, as I baptize this child in the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

The Trinity dwells within us. We live this mystery every day of our earthly lives. In John, chapter 14, Jesus tells his disciples, "The Father and I are one." He speaks about sending "another Counselor," the Holy Spirit, who will speak to their hearts. God continually reveals Himself to us as one God, who exists in three distinct persons.

I remember sitting on my deck one beautiful summer evening a few years ago. We have a lovely pond just beyond our back fence, and occasionally we see some of God's creation in the form of ducks or deer feeding near the pond. On this particular evening, I looked down and saw three deer standing together, taking a drink from the pond. This was indeed a sign of the Trinity! I gazed in wonder for a few moments before they spotted me and dashed away. I was reminded, in that moment, that God is Father, Son and Spirit. I felt privileged to witness this "trinity of wildlife" in my own backyard.

This weekend, we celebrate the Trinity. We are constantly invoking the Trinity in the many practices of our Catholic faith such as in the Mass, when we sign ourselves in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. The priest greets us with an invocation taken directly from scripture, "May the grace of our Lord, Jesus Christ, the love of God and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with you."

Our gospel for this Trinity Sunday is taken from the final lines of the last chapter of Matthew's gospel. We read that the disciples worshipped Jesus, but they still doubted. Jesus says these words:

> "Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, until the end of the age."

Jesus called his disciples to go out and bring people into this communion of love, called the Trinity. He reminded them that he would never leave them. Do you and I believe what Jesus said?

Our life in Christ is intimately connected to our baptism. The reality is that something special happened on that day. We became sons and daughters of a loving God, who made a way for the sin of our first parents to be wiped away. We were set free from original sin, welcomed into God's family and given the gifts of the Holy Spirit to guide us on our earthly journey. God the Father, Son and Holy Spirit took hold of us on that important day. God never lets go of us! As disciples, we are called to bring others to Christ. Our daily encounters may bring us more often into the presence of those who have strayed from the faith, as opposed to those who have never heard the Good News. Regardless, the grace of our baptism equips us to enter into our call to be disciples. We never know when or under what circumstances we will be called to testify to our faith, so we should always be prepared!

God is all around us. He is present in our hearts, in the sacraments and in the created world. Today, we recall the great mystery of God as a Trinity of persons united in love. Each of us is united to heaven by the indwelling of the Holy Trinity. We are enfolded in a three-fold bond of love that surrounds us throughout our earthly life.

Today as you dip your finger in the holy water or pray grace at a meal, remember the Trinity of love that is God!





This month's Neighbors Spotlight is shining neighbors, inc. on Eduardo and his family. This happened a few months ago. I have not seen them since, but I think it is important to share their story. Eduardo, his wife and son had just arrived in Minnesota from Puerto Rico. They came here because the hurricane



destroyed their life there, and the reconstruction of their home territory had been so delayed. The day they came into Neighbors, was one of our "normal" winter days-about 8 degrees. I asked what on earth would cause them to pick Minnesota as their new residence, and Eduardo told me "jobs." He had already found a job here at a warehouse, and his father-in-law had helped the family find an apartment. They just needed some food to help them out before the paychecks started to come in, which would be in a couple of weeks. In addition to food, our intake workers provided a small stack of other resources that we thought would be helpful.

# Reflections on the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of My Ordination to the Priesthood

I welcome and thank you for this opportunity to share with you a few thanksgiving notes, thoughts and reflections from my last 50 plus years of priestly and parish ministry.

First of all, I will give you a little personal background. My heart has always been in Crosslake at my parent's cabin, in which I now live. My parents built that cabin in 1935, seven years before I was born. I am the youngest of six children, raised in a very loving, stable family environment in south Minneapolis and Incarnation Parish. Every summer since 1935, my mom would move up to the cabin with us from Memorial Day through Labor Day. My dad, who worked as a stock broker in Minneapolis, would drive up every weekend. We had to have "sunnies" for that Friday's supper! Dad would then drive back Sunday night or early Monday morning for work. These were idyllic, simple, lake-dreamy summers for all of us.

After grade school at "Inkie," I went to St. Thomas Military Academy for high school and then to the seminary for eight years of philosophy and theology studies. I was ordained to the priesthood for the Archdiocese of St. Paul and Minneapolis, at the Cathedral of St. Paul, on March 9, 1968, with 15 of my classmates. After ordination, we would help on the weekends at parishes within the Archdiocese, until we finished our studies in June of 1968. Much to my delight, my first assignment was to the Cathedral in St. Paul, where I had wonderful experiences and mentoring with four or five other priests and a wonderful pastor/mentor in Msgr. Ambrose Hayden. After seven years there, as an associate, I was an associate at Maternity of Mary in St. Paul. I had two wonderful experiences as an associate pastor in those nine years. That is unheard of in this day and age, and yet, when I was named pastor for the first time in 1977, I was the youngest pastor in the Archdiocese. In light of the shortage of priests today, most young priests have only one "associate experience" and then are asked to become a pastor, after two years or less as an associate. This is a tough challenge, but with the parishioners' loving support, these young priests are meeting the challenge admirably. God bless them and all of you!

I served as a pastor for 31 years in three different parishes: St. Peter's in Mendota from 1977 to 1989, Guardian Angels in Lakeville (now Oakdale), from 1989 to 1997 and St. Patrick's in Inver Grove Heights from 1997 to 2008. I had been asked to serve in other capacities in the Archdiocese, but I have always opted to stay in parish ministry, which was always my first love. I am grateful to my archbishops for giving me that choice to stay on the front lines of the church in parish ministry. As an associate, but especially as a pastor, I was energized by parishioners, excellent staff and my brother priests, who kept me balanced, real, practical and pastoral.

The modeling of collaborative, shared ministry, along with an inclusive attitude towards all, made and helped me/us grow together. It wasn't always easy, but it was the only way I saw in preaching and living the Gospel, the Good News of Jesus Christ. I may be liberal in some issues,

conservative in others, but the overriding attitude is always to be pastoral, caring and kind in all things, to be Christ to one another. Again, it is not always easy, and God knows I made plenty of mistakes along the way, but pastoral was the necessary and overriding option or mantra. I loved parish ministry and that was, and is, where my heart will always be, even as I continue to help from time to time in the Diocese of Duluth. Thank you to Bishop Sirba, my brother priests and parishioners for your continued support.

I believe I have always been, and continue to be, a positive priest. I have been saddened by a few things over these last 50 years. The number one sadness, of course, is the sexual abuse of youth perpetrated by some clergy. For that I am again deeply saddened for all. Many times, during these difficult times, it was tough to "wear the collar" in public. I apologize and pray for, on behalf of the church, those who were victimized and for their families. Hopefully, we are moving forward in a more positive way.

The second sadness I felt over the years was the departure from priestly ministry by some of my classmates and friends. Although I always supported them in their decisions, things just wouldn't be the same, and we went our separate ways. There just has to be a better solution to these men and women. Come Holy Spirit, enlighten us! I think sometimes that the Holy Spirit is speaking to us, but we just are not listening! Just saying. . .

The third thing that saddens me, and yet gives me pause and purpose as a man, priest and pastor, is the difficult crosses that so many are asked to bear. This gives way to the Good News of Jesus' Gospel that we are first and foremost an Easter people. Sometimes a tough message, but in the end, one that rings true for those of us who believe in Jesus Christ. That's why my favorite quote and mantra has been that of divine wisdom from St. Mother Teresa of Calcutta: "Be kinder than necessary to everyone you meet, because everyone you meet is fighting some kind of daily battle, carrying a cross, big or small, and has a story to tell. Yes, be kinder than necessary to everyone you meet." Once again, not always easy to do or be, but that is what you and I are called to do and be, as a disciple of Jesus!

Thank you for this opportunity to share a few of my pastoral reflections from these 50 years of grateful service in our Lord's ministry.

I look forward to celebrating a Mass of Thanksgiving with you. Thank you for your loving, caring support always. God bless us all!
