Divine Mercy Novena 2014...

*Is a wonderful way to prepare to celebrate Divine Mercy Sunday.
A novena is 9 days of prayer in honor of God's Divine Mercy.
It begins on Good Friday, April 18, and ends on Saturday, April 26, the eve of the Feast.*

The different souls prayed for each day of the Novena are:

- Day 1 – All mankind, especially sinners
- Day 2 – The souls of priests and religious
- Day 3 – All devout and faithful souls
- Day 4 – Those who do not believe in Jesus and those who do not yet know Him
- Day 5 – The souls of the departed brethren
- Day 6 – The meek and humble souls and the souls of children
- Day 7 – The souls who especially venerate and glorify Jesus' mercy
- Day 8 – The souls who are detained in purgatory
- Day 9 – The souls who have become lukewarm

You are encouraged to receive sacramental Confession and Eucharistic Communion either on April 26 or on one of “several days preceding or following” Divine Mercy Sunday (see norm 23-3, [Handbook of Indulgence](#), 1991)
